Supporting the New Community Foundation - Pottstown Area Health & Wellness Foundation

Carl and Sylvia Landis were excited to be the first donor-advised fund at the Pottstown Area Health & Wellness Foundation as it became a "Community Foundation" on July 1, 2023.

While staying true to its core mission of health and wellness and its support of local charities, the Foundation can now further broaden the reach beyond just health and wellness purposes to other causes or passions that matter to people within our community. "The Foundation's change in status from a private foundation to a public foundation will allow even more opportunities for the community," noted Carl.

Carl and Sylvia have a hometown love story of their own, meeting in Pottstown in 1970 when they were both working as first-year teachers at Pottstown's Northern Junior High School. Their story continued as they married a few years later, and moved down the street to North Coventry where they raised two sons, Paul and John.

Carl's path from teaching and graduate school led him next to become an engineering manager for a small company. But his strong, entrepreneurial spirit motivated him to start his own business, which was the step that laid the foundation for his robust and life-long work in the nonprofit sector. Sylvia, a retired teacher with a big heart, dedicates much of her time to causes near and dear to her, with both of their passions often aligning for greater good.

In 1991, Carl was one of the original founders of the Pottstown SCORE Chapters, and Sylvia followed upon her retirement as a member. Recent months have shown the value of becoming a community foundation. Allowing our community to expand its focus beyond health and wellness is providing more opportunities for individuals to make an impact, as we reimagine what is possible for the future of Pottstown and the Tri-County Region.

Honoring the ultimate service to community: A new endowment fund was created at the PAHWF from the Estate of an Anonymous Vietnam Veteran – Member of Chapter 565 to create a fund that will provide a long-lasting tribute for our Pottstown Vietnam Veterans. As our veterans age, it is comforting to know there will be a symbolic space maintained in perpetuity at Memorial Park, memorializing those who gave so much.

Responding to urgent community need: We are currently working with a local family to help them honor the memory of a loved one through a Behavioral Health/Registered Nurse Student Loan Forgiveness Program in the Boyertown/Tri-County Area. You will be hearing more about this new fund in the coming weeks and the incredible life of a faithful community servant, and beloved nurse, wife, mother.

Impact by the next generation: Lilly and Natalie, two inspiring11-year-old girls from Gilbertsville, have a love for hockey. When they learned their community hockey rink was in jeopardy of being removed they reached out to their township officials to share their concerns. Their hard work and determination resulted in a generous \$200,000 donation from the Philadelphia Flyers Charities to transform the current hockey rink into a state-of-the-art facility at New Hanover Community Park. The Foundation is honored to work with the girls, the Flyers Charities and New Hanover Township to make this gift a reality.

The Foundation continues to support businesses and nonprofits through diverse initiatives and grants. Whether making dreams come true or creating opportunities for community reflection, healing, and enjoyment, the Foundation is nurturing a supportive community, expanding opportunities and improving quality-of-life for all ages and backgrounds.

All Aboard! Pottstown's Thriving Communities Initiative Moves Full Steam Ahead

As the <u>Thriving Communities</u> project gains momentum, current goals focus on bringing together stakeholders. This transit-oriented development, initiated by the proposed reactivation of the <u>Philadelphia to Reading passenger rail line</u>, is in its learning stage. The Foundation is working to bring awareness of the opportunities this reactivation will allow and to acquire a knowledge base of best practices.

Recent progress included a local visit from the Department of Transportation to share more about the proposed transportation system, develop action items, and provide tours. The Foundation has been concentrating on recruiting attendees for the national Mpact Transit + Community Conference being held in Philadelphia from October 20-23 this year.

PAHWF's senior program officer, <u>Howard Brown</u>, is part of the Mpact national steering committee. Brown was chosen to be featured in their blog and to contribute an article. His enthusiasm is contagious as he leads the effort to increase interest.

The learning cohort will focus on equitable transit-oriented development and how that can be leveraged to benefit our Pottstown community. Our ultimate goal is to build opportunities and infrastructure for education, workforce development, revitalization, sustainability, and, of

course, transportation. Through collaboration, we combine diverse strengths to maximize resources and impact.

Those who wish to attend the Mpact conference are invited to apply for a scholarship. "Participants will engage as a community in defining what is equitable. That's empowering," notes Brown. There is a lot of work to be done, which includes ensuring we mitigate any displacement issues that may result. The more voices involved, the more proactive the Foundation can be in predicting any challenges and working toward solutions.

The Foundation is working with a team of consultants to help pursue the extensive grants available nationwide. This will strengthen our ability to obtain funding without burdening our current resources. The project completion date is predicted to be about three to five years from now.

"Our current goal is to continue increasing awareness of this rail project. Those interested are encouraged to contribute by helping create the infrastructure for tasks ahead. We are looking for motivated community members who are dedicated to joining us at the table in a thoughtful way," states Brown.

The Foundation continues to accept scholarship applications to attend the Mpact Transit + Community Conference this fall. The scholarship award is prioritized for Pottstown residents who reside in the Pottstown Community Survey area, employees of Pottstown-based microbusinesses, and non-profit staff whose organization meets the budget restrictions. The Foundation's support includes the conference costs and travel stipend. In return, the recipient enjoys the opportunity to participate in the next steps of this rail reactivation journey.

Play Streets 2024

The first Pottstown Play Streets was held Thursday, June 13, at Pottstown's Washington/West St. Park.

Play Streets temporarily closes streets to traffic in Pottstown neighborhoods and provides free play games and recreational equipment to create safe, fun, and healthy spaces for children, families, and neighbors to connect and play right outside their doors. The program runs from 5:30 to 7:30 PM on seven select Thursdays throughout the summer.





Play Streets program is led by the Borough of Pottstown's Department of Parks and Recreation. The Pottstown Area

Health & Wellness Foundation, a 501(c)3 community foundation, brought together the resources and partners needed to launch the program in the summer of 2022. 16 partners, including the Borough and the Foundation, eventually joined together and formed the first Pottstown Play Streets Coalition to deliver six events serving 467 audience members. This collaborative effort won the Borough its first ever Excellence in Recreation and Parks Award from the Pennsylvania Recreation and Park Society in 2023.

The partner network expanded to 27 for the 2023 season, but hazardous weather conditions limited partners to five events that served 427 residents. The Borough has continued to support program model improvement by including a rain date in 2023 and expanding to two rain dates in 2024 if two or more cancellations happen. The Foundation continues to support and coordinate the efforts of the Borough and an ever-growing network of private and non-profit partners to reconvene the Pottstown Play Streets Coalition on an annual basis.

Sylvia served on the Creative Health Services Board, the Boyertown Historical Society, and is currently on the Board of the Tri County Active Adult Center and the General Carl Spaatz World War II Museum in Boyertown. "We enjoy connecting people with charities and love to spread the wonderful news of this beautiful area and all it has to offer. There is so much to experience and gain – right here in our own backyard," shares Sylvia as she noted the free biking and outdoor opportunities through the Schuylkill River Greenways, Challenger Learning Center and the "Science on a Sphere" exhibit at the Montgomery County Community College.

To the Landis family, charity begins in one's hometown. While donating to a few large national charities, Carl and Sylvia soon realized they wanted their efforts to benefit the place they call home in the Pottstown area. "We want to experience not only the joy of giving through our living years, but we also want to leave a lasting legacy so our work can be continued and our generosity can live on." It is inspiring to see what our donations to local charities have accomplished. For our own personal situation,

the most-tax efficient methods of donating have been through qualified charitable distributions (QCDs) directly to charities and appreciated assets to the Community Foundation," noted Carl.

Carl also shared that "In the past, Pottstown residents have been generous, but now Pottstown can benefit even more from having its very own Community Foundation". He added that there are requirements to maintain Community Foundation status, and that with his expertise and background, as well as both his and Sylvia's extensive networking in everything from nature to educational initiatives, they are committed to helping meet those goals.

New Grant Fund Announced/Play Streets Schedule

Pottstown Community Voices Grant Fund: For Residents, By Residents



A new initiative for the
Foundation, the Pottstown
Community Voices Grant
Fund (PCVGF) has enjoyed
meaningful participation
by residents and nonprofit
organizations. This opportunity
prioritized community voice in
the design and implementation
of the framework to address

specific issues that were identified during a recent health needs assessment.

This participatory grant-making fund granted a total of \$100,000 in response to a community health survey that focused on six census block groups within the Borough of Pottstown. Decisions on how the funds were distributed were driven by a group of community members that live in the survey area and are committed to accelerating change. This PCVGF Advisory Council met multiple times to review the applications and discuss their alignment with the request for proposals. Each of the programs and projects awarded met the requirement of positively impacting the community through: access to parks, recreation, and green spaces; positive mental health solutions; neighborhood safety; housing support; and elimination of barriers to employment.

The following nonprofits are the recipients. Each met at least one of the aforementioned criteria, focused on improving the health and well-being of Pottstown residents in neighborhoods of historic disinvestment.

We are proud to support these organizations, which align with the priorities of the PCVGF. Through vigorous review, the Advisory Council ensured they are committed to growing a thriving, healthy, and successful future for Pottstown, informed by, and invested in, the community.

Participatory grant making requires a different approach to implementation. PAHWF worked with Strategy Arts, a consultant group with expertise in equitable community engagement, to facilitate the process. Through engaging directly with residents that live, work, and play in the impacted neighborhoods, a uniquely personal perspective guided the selection process.

"This new initiative prioritized the community voice in the grantmaking process. The outcome reflects the value of the lived experience in decision making, and the residential engagement required in cultivating the healthiest community possible," says Craig Colistra, PAHWF program officer.
